

Filled with the Spirit

Acts 2:4 All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

April showers bring May flowers...or so the saying goes. May will also bring about many milestones and transitions. The Easter season will transition into the season of Pentecost, moving us from stories of the resurrection to the promise of being accompanied by the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday (May 19th).

Excerpts from Sundays and Seasons

SUNDAY MAY 5th – 6th Sunday of Easter

This Sunday's image of the life the risen Christ shares with us is the image of friendship. We are called to serve others as Jesus came to serve; but for John's gospel, the image of servanthood is too hierarchical, too distant, to capture the essence of life with Christ. Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other. This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.

Readings and Psalm

Acts 10:44-48 The Spirit poured out on the Gentiles Psalm 98 Shout with joy to the Lord, all you lands. (Ps. 98:4) 1 John 5:1-6The victory of faith John 15:9-17 Christ the friend and lover

SUNDAY MAY 12th – 7th Sunday of Easter

The gospel for Easter's seventh Sunday is always taken from the long prayer Jesus prays for his followers in John's gospel on the night before his death, and always includes Jesus' desire that his followers will be one as he and the Father are one. This oneness is not mere doctrinal agreement or institutional unity, but mutual abiding, interpenetrating life, mutual love, and joy. This oneness is the work of the Spirit whom we have received but also await. Come, Holy Spirit!

Readings and Psalm

Acts 1:15-17, 21-26 Matthias added to the apostles Psalm 1 The Lord knows the way of the righteous. (Ps. 1:6) 1 John 5:9-13 Life in the Son of God John 17:6-19 Christ's prayer for his disciples

SUNDAY MAY 19th – Pentecost

Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Crossing all boundaries that would separate us, the Spirit brings the wideness of God's mercy to places we least expect it—to a crowd of strangers of different lands and tongues, to dry bones, to our weak hearts. Jesus promises his disciples that they will be accompanied by the Holy Spirit, and that this Spirit reveals the truth. We celebrate that we too have been visited with this same Spirit. Guided by the truth, we join together in worship, and then disperse to share the fullness of Christ's love with the world.

Readings and Psalm

Acts 2:1-21 Filled with the Spirit to tell God's deeds

Ezekiel 37:1-14 (alternate) Life to dry bones

Psalm 104:24-34, 35b Send forth your Spirit and renew the face of the earth. (Ps. 104:30)

Romans 8:22-27 Praying with the Spirit

Acts 2:1-21 (alternate) Filled with the Spirit to tell God's deeds

John 15:26-27; 16:4b-15 Christ sends the Spirit of truth

SUNDAY MAY 26th - The Holy Trinity - 1st Sunday after Pentecost

When we say God is the triune God, we are saying something about who God is beyond, before, and after the universe: that there is community within God. Our experience of this is reflected in Paul's words today. When we pray to God as Jesus prayed to his Abba (an everyday, intimate parental address), the Spirit prays within us, creating between us and God the same relationship Jesus has with the one who sent him.

Isaiah 6:1-8 Isaiah's vision and call

Psalm 29 Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. (Ps. 29:2)

Romans 8:12-17 Living by the Spirit

John 3:1-17 Entering the reign of God through water and the Spirit

140th Anniversary Celebration News

Yee Haw! The Frontier Days float is on. Jerry Carson is the coordinator, Bernie Ernst and Dennis Brunner are going to do a mock up of the little white church on the corner, the Repshire's will be provide a trailer and driver. Now we just need you! The next meeting for the float is on May 5th. Be on the look out for more information or come to the meeting.

The big day July 14, 2024, (140 years!) will bring a special worship at St. Paul's and a picnic at Holliday Park. How does grilled hamburgers (veggie burgers), brats and hot dogs sound? We have a nice grill but will need some terrific chefs to grill to perfection. But, that is not all, for dessert we are having cake and homemade ice cream (yum). Do you have an ice cream maker? The congregation can bring sides to share. If you know of a former member who you would like to invite, we would love to share this special day with them!

Did you know?

Here are some of the things that went on in Cheyenne, and the world, in the 20 years before we became a church!

- 1864 Andrew Johnson elected President
- 1867 Nov. (purchased property) Nebraska Pastor Henry Kuhns of Omaha (who was deeply loved and respected) had established 25 churches, received a deed to the General Synod for plots of land in Cheyenne from the UP Railroad. Similar lots, measuring 66 x 132 feet were sold for \$150, two of these lots were bought at 19th and House Streets by Pastor Kuhn, by the end of the year these lots were selling for \$2,500. Pastor Kuhns returned to Omaha in 1887 where he died in 1899.
 - Railroad: Cheyenne was a tent city for crews installing the railroad tracks nearby and through Cheyenne. Cheyenne was known as "Hell on Wheels" during this time. The construction crews for the railroad increased the Cheyenne Population from near zero to 3,000 to 6,000 by the end of the year, with only 400 women and 200 children. As the railroad tracks construction was completed and crews then moved on the population was reduced to less than 1500 by 1870.
- 1868 U.S. Grant elected President
- **1870** Population of Cheyenne: 1,450, 6:1 ration of men to women.
- **1875** The "Golden Days" in Cheyenne. Cattle ranching profitable due to prairies around Cheyenne, attracts people from east and overseas. Traffic to Dakota gold fields flows, ornate mansions built, Cheyenne becomes a boom town.
 - 66 places to purchase liquor in Cheyenne
- **1876** Battle of Little Bighorn in Montana
 - Telephone Invented, Alexander Graham Bell
 - Rutherford B. Hayes elected President
- 1879 St. John's Catholic Church, now St. Mary's built stone building
 - Lightbulb Invented, Thomas Edison
- **1880** Population of Cheyenne: 3,456, 2.6:1 ration of men to women
 - Over 300,000 cattle were brought from Texas to load on railroad cars east of Cheyenne. It was said that some young men considered to be "toughs" in the eastern Nebraska area came to Wyoming in the early 1880s in order to live the "Real Life", but soon returned to their homes because life out here was too rough even for them. A man's life was worth nothing, they said. The old jail was overflowing, it was the day of Calamity Jane and Buffalo Bill who also visited Cheyenne
 - James Garfield elected President (died from blood poisoning 2 months after being shot)
 - Chester Arthur becomes President
- 1882 Cheyenne is one of the 1st cities in the US to use electric lighting for street lights.
- 1883 Only known lynch mob ever in Cheyenne Hung Henry Mosier




